We are fortunate, as a community, to have four highly qualified individuals step


forward to run for the three year term on the Board of Directors. $\label{eq:constraint}$

Season is passing by very quickly and we are now at the peak of the busy season. We welcome any suggestions and comments to improve your community and the amenities. A brief update follows, but a more detailed account is provided at the monthly Homeowner's Meeting on the first Monday of each month.

FINANCIALS. Maple Leaf Estates Homeowners' Corporation finished the 2017 budget year well within budget for both the operating and capital budgets. The unaudited 2017

financial statements and approved 2018 budgets are being sent to all certificate holders. The audited 2017 financial statements will be completed by the Annual Meeting. A financial summary follows this article.

GUESTS IN THE PARK. Over the recent holidays we had a small number of violations of the Rules & Regulations. Most violations pertained to unsupervised children visiting our community, but there were also some violations by visiting adults. Please remember that visiting children under the age of 12 <u>must</u> be accompanied by an adult when away from the lot they are visiting. We are concerned with their safety. Children under the age of 12 can only utilize the designated swimming pool behind the CanAm Clubhouse unless there are special exceptions granted by the Board of Directors during holidays and spring break. Children under the age of 16 are required to wear a safety helmet when riding a bicycle according to State law and are not permitted to drive a golf cart.

DAMAGE TO COMMON PROPERTY. There are numerous occasions when someone damages the Park common property. Street lamps have been destroyed when hit by a vehicle. The street lamps cost approximately \$2,800 each. There are many other common elements damaged like fences, vehicle access gates, bicycle racks, furniture, etc. There are responsible homeowners who promptly report the damage to the Park Office, but many times no one claims responsibility. People may assume the Park insurance will take care of damage, but that is normally not the case because we have a \$5,000 deductible per claim. We request that any damage be reported to the Park Office by not only the person causing the damage, but also by witnesses. Your cooperation is important to limit unnecessary expenditures.

WALKING ON MAPLE LEAF ROADS. The original developer of Maple Leaf did not build sidewalks. As a result walkers, joggers, and bicyclists generally use the roads. Obviously that also causes safety concerns. One of the biggest issues is walkers being two, three, or four abreast and traffic has to divert into the other lane. Walkers should stay as close to the side of the road as possible and walk in single file. Walkers should also walk against traffic and wear bright clothing. At night walkers should carry lights and wear reflective clothing.

SPEEDING. The most violated rule in the Park is speeding – it is normally residents and not just commercial vehicle drivers. Don't cause an accident, injury, or even death because you were speeding.

GOLF COURSE. Please read Superintendent Nancy Miller's article for important information about the upcoming golf course rejuvenation. Your golf course is getting a lot of play. You can help the conditioning by filling divots, repairing ball marks, and raking the sand traps.

PRO SHOP. PGA Professional John Sileno offers a great selection of apparel, golf lessons, and other items. We desire to reduce our Pro Shop inventory by as much as possible prior to the golf course closure on April 1st. As a result the pricing is being discounted by 25%. Additionally if a person spends at least \$100 for apparel in one purchase then he/she is entitled to a free round of golf with cart.

SANDBAR AND COUNTRY CLUB. There are many things going on in your Country Club. There is Tuesday Happy Hour with entertainment, Thursday night "Wings" with entertainment, special dinners, movie nights, and many other happenings. There are daily breakfast and lunch specials. Sunday breakfast is extremely popular to include breakfast buffet on specific Sundays. Check the flyers, CH 195, and special updates from the Accents Editor.

SALES OFFICE. There is a lot of activity in the real estate area. We encourage you to visit our four very experienced associates for your real estate needs.

RENTER'S RECEPTION. There will be a reception and information session for all renters on Wednesday, February 20th, at 9:30 a.m., in the Country Club. We encourage all renters to attend.

REAL PROPERTY TAX BILLS. If you are a certificate holder and have not paid your 2017 property taxes you can still receive a 2% discount for paying in January or a 1% discount for paying in February.

TELEPHONE DIRECTORY. The 2018 Park Telephone Directory is available in the Park Office. Old Park telephone books should be placed in recycle and not in the Post Office.

PARK PERMITS. A Park Permit is required for any modification outside the home or on the lot in accordance with the Rules & Regulations.

SPACE REQUISITIONS. The space requisition forms for the 2018-2019 season are available at the Park Office.

LOT CARE. It is not too soon to begin thinking about who will care for your lot when you go north for the summer. We strongly recommend that you do not pay contractors in advance for your lot care. They should be paid only after the work is completed. There have been many instances of contractors only caring for your lot just before you return in the fall rather than doing the work all summer as you assumed the work would be done.

PARK IRRIGATION

This year we have had unprecedented requests for irrigation flagging. After your irrigation has been flagged, PLEASE take photos, make a map, whatever you can do to identify your sprinkler locations. We have been flagging 10-12 homes per day since the end of October in addition to repairing and adjusting sprinkler heads. This leaves us little time to do preventive maintenance, check the electrical grounds and other

maintenance on the system. Lack of preventive maintenance can lead to expensive repairs in the future.

LAWN MOWING

Our contract with Blue Heron, the mowing company, is for one cut in December, January and February. We mow early in December and the second week of January so we don't mow during the peak of Christmas decorating. In March, we start bi-monthly cutting again.

COLD TEMPERATURES ON LANDSCAPE PLANTS

We have had some very cold nights during January. If the cold damages your plants, do NOT cut them back or remove them right away. Most of our Florida plants will survive a cold snap. Wait until all danger of cold weather has passed then trim off any damaged areas. There is an excellent chance that the plant will recover completely.

GOLF COURSE

GLYPHOSATE/ROUNDUP

I understand the serious concerns that some people have for the use of glyphosate. I will try to ease some of those concerns:

Not safe/Safe

I found many articles on the harmful effects of glyphosate, but not in peer-reviewed or scientific journals. For every article decrying the effects, I found more articles in scientific and government journals showing no causal relationship between glyphosate exposure and cancers.

Toxicity

All products are toxic when a person is exposed to or injests large quantities – water, salt, food.

Roundup Label – signal words are required for all EPA registered pesticides based on acute toxicity.

There are 3 categories:

Danger

Warning

Caution

Roundup (glyphosate has and has always had a Caution signal word identifying it as being in the least toxic category of registered pesticides.

History

Glyphosate was introduced to consumer market as Roundup in 1974 and has been off-patent since 1980. It is the most heavily used pesticide in the world.

In 2007 – most used herbicide in US agriculture and 2nd most used in home and garden.

By 2016, there was a 100 fold increase from the late 1970's in use.

As with all pesticides, the label is the law. We have two licensed pesticide applicators on staff and we are ALWAYS extremely careful and conscientious when handling pesticides, for our own protection as well as yours.

For this application we are hiring a professional, licensed pesticide application company to apply the product at label rates.

We will be spraying with large droplets not a fine mist to keep the product out of the air.

EPA studies show that glyphosate is non-volatile and EPA inhalation studies show low toxicity.

Our product is rainfast after 1 hour and adsorbs to soil. The residue is generally immobile so it doesn't affect ground or surface water.

Reentry when dry. To be safe, we are keeping the course closed for at least 12 hours following the applications. We are spraying at 3pm with the course closed until the following morning.

Applications will be postponed if conditions are too windy

SPRAY DATES AND TIMES:

These are the dates and times of the applications, weather permitting:

Tuesday, February 20, 3pm-to 6pm

Tuesday, March 6, 3pm-6pm

Thursday, March 22, 3pm-6pm

IF YOU ARE SENSITIVE TO ANY OF THESE PRODUCTS, PLEASE MAKE APPROPRIATE ARRANGEMENTS.

Glyphosate is one of the most tested and studied pesticides in the world.

These are the studies that I found to be the most scientific and informative:

- 1. The WHO and FAO Joint Committee on Pesticide Residues issued a report in 2016 confirming use "of glyphosate formulations does not constitute a health risk."
- 2. European Chemicals Agency recent study "did not find evidence implicating it to be a carcinogen, a mutagen, toxic to reproduction, nor toxic to specific organs."

"In accordance with the 2005 Guidelines for Carcinogenic Risk, based on weight of evidence, glyphosate is classified as "Not Likely to be Carcinogenic to Humans."

If you have concerns about exposure, we have publicized the dates and times of the applications so please make arrangements to be away from the golf course and those times.

As always – fill your divots, repair your ball marks and rake your bunkers.

An Update on our Golf Rejuvenation Project:

Some of you have been asking about the status and progress of the golf course rejuvenation project: What is the status? How much did it cost? How many contractors bid on the project? Etc. With this article I will try and answer some of these questions.

Background:

Since many of our residents are new to our community in the past three years I think it is important to provide a little background.

This golf course rejuvenation project was first introduced to our Certificate holders back in 2014 by then Treasurer Rick Flagler when he presented a thirty-year capital plan as part of the preparatory work for the renegotiation of our mortgage. In addition to the normal yearly capital program, the Board at that time identified three additional major projects: the golf course rejuvenation, replacement of the park irrigation system and renovation of the maintenance building. In order to pay for these projects, the mortgage negotiations provided for, in addition to the \$8M base amount, three additional draws of \$1.5M each to pay for these three projects.

When the Board presented its capital plan in 2016, concern was raised by the certificate holders regarding the extent of the work and the amount of the borrowing. In response the Board invited community input through the formation of three committees: a golf technical committee, an irrigation technical committee and a finance advisory committee. These committees worked together over the following year and made the following recommendations:

- i) The golf technical committee recommended that the course be rejuvenated; however the proposed changes to the design of the course were not needed and should be removed from the plans.
- ii) The irrigation technical committee agreed that the golf course irrigation system should be replaced in view of the plans to totally rejuvenate the golf course. However the committee recommended against the replacement of the park irrigation system. It did recommend improvements in the maintenance program and recommended an asset management approach to the irrigation system in order to build up data and be better able to track problem areas and costs and prioritize system replacement.
- iii) The finance advisory committee also recommended against replacement of the park irrigation system. It identified four options for financing of the golf rejuvenation project for consideration by the certificate holders.

The Board accepted all of these recommendations and proceeded with a Ballot to the certificate holders with respect to the method of financing. By a vote of the certificate holders, it was decided that the project should be financed by an additional draw on the mortgage in the amount of \$1.4M.

It is important to emphasize here that the Board has a fiduciary responsibility to the shareholders (certificate holders) to protect and preserve the assets of the park. In this respect it was determined that the project was necessary and with extensive input from the community providing additional guidance, the path forward was established.

Next Steps:

The golf course rejuvenation design was completed by our golf course architect, Gordy Lewis who has been working with Maple Leaf on our course for many years and you will see his name on our score cards. The irrigation system design was completed by Regan Irrigation Design. In addition, the Board decided to engage DMK consultants to oversee the entire

project bidding and construction process in order to properly protect the best interests of Maple Leaf during this project implementation. DMK has completed many projects for Maple Leaf over the years and is very familiar with our park.

The bidding process for construction was by invitation to pre-qualified contractors who had expressed a previous interest in our project and exhibited the proper background experience. The bidding was very competitive and eight bids were received. The low bidder for the golf course rejuvenation was Westscapes and for the irrigation system the low bidder was Mondragon, both of whom are well experienced in the business.

The construction project includes two additional components: the re-grassing of the lawn bowling green and an interconnection from the new golf irrigation system to the residential phase one irrigation system. The lawn bowling green is identical to the golf greens utilizing the same grass type and maintenance equipment and it was decided that this facility should properly be re-grassed at the same time. The interconnection of the irrigation system to the Phase 1 residential system will allow the retirement of the Phase 1 Pump Station, which has been an ongoing maintenance problem.

In summary the construction cost for the work is summarized (approximately) as follows and this is detailed in the approved capital budget:

Golf Course Rejuvenation: \$1,375,000

Lawn Bowling Green \$ 31,400

Phase 1 Irrigation Connection: \$ 61,200

Total \$1,467,600

The Path Forward:

The contractors undertaking the golf course rejuvenation will be commencing work on Monday April 2nd. In preparation for that, we will be commencing killing the grass on the fairways and tees toward the end of February. This will involve the use of the herbicide "Roundup" that is in common use for this type of application across the United States. Some homeowners have expressed concerns regarding the safety of Roundup from a health perspective. Our golf course superintendent Nancy Miller has talked about this at homeowners' meetings and has an article in this issue of Accents detailing its use and risks. The bottom line is that its safe use is approved for this type of application by the US Environmental Protection Agency and there really is no realistic alternative. The dates and timing for the Roundup application will be well advertised to homeowners so that everyone can take whatever precautions they deem necessary and appropriate.

A question has been raised regarding the use of our own staff during the construction period. First of all the pro shop will be closed and all of the starters as part time staff will be laid off for the summer. However the golf course maintenance staff will be an integral part of the rejuvenation project and will be employed through the construction period and beyond. During the actual construction, there are many items of work that will be undertaken by our own staff including such as removal and storing of the existing irrigation sprinkler heads, building of a new timber retaining wall at hole 3, etc. The current schedule projects that the construction contractors will complete their work within about twelve weeks. Following that time period, our own staff will take over for the "grow in" period (July – October)

and will be busy fertilizing and cutting the new grass, replacing the yardage markers, etc. so that the course will be ready for the November 2018 season.

We are looking forward to the enjoyment of our newly rejuvenated course. The greens were last refurbished in 2002 and the fairways, tees and irrigation system are original from the time the course was constructed so we will see a dramatic improvement after the rejuvenation project is completed. The last couple of years have been trying and emotional for many – both golfers and non-golfers. I am hopeful that we can now put all of that behind us and work together in the true Maple Leaf spirit to support our club and make our golf operations an ongoing success.

Many teachers spend time and money preparing lessons to cater to the needs of all their students and make sure all students attain the best result. Appreciate and enjoy!



Sales Office Notes for February John Meissner

Welcome back everyone; We know you've come to an unusually cold Florida this past week, but you've avoided the shoveling and the freezing pipes up north, so there a lot to like about being here.

Here's a synopsis of Maple Leaf Real Estate 2017:

Preserving the value of your home-

Since many of you are snowbirds, its easy to forget as the years go by how the homes do age, even when you're not here to enjoy them. Avoiding some basic maintenance and some remodeling or improvements may seem like good economics but can be detrimental to the home's value, and actually pose a danger to your asset.

Heritage homes, the ones built in the 70s and 80s, mostly have membrane roofs that have 30 year lives, and many were replaced after hurricane Charley, but those that have only been patched or repaired may be in danger of failing. Newer homes' roofs are approaching the end of their lives; many have already been replaced. If you've never been in Florida during a summer downpour, I can tell you it is an impressive amount of water and it will get thru a weak roof. If that

moisture sits for a month or two while you're gone, you have some other costly repairs in addition to the roof replacement.

I recommend you have your wiring checked, especially in the heritage homes. The wiring there is 40 years old; and the Florida heat, humidity and little critters take their toll.

Many of you have a humidistat; the little dial next to your thermostat. I've heard many wild ideas about how this is supposed to be used. I can clear that up for you right now; while you are here, the dial should be in the "on" position (all the way to the left). When you close up for the summer, put it on the setting of the highest you want the humidity to get, regardless of temperature (I would say 60% max). Then set your thermostat on the highest you want the temperature to get (no higher than 84). This will keep mold and mildew from building up over the summer.

Lastly, I recommend you be sure the crawlspace beneath your home is properly sealed with wire mesh, and the vapor barrier is in place and in good repair. Florida is full of little critters that love to live in your home while you're away, and they can get in the smallest holes and crevices.

Keeping good maintenance in practice, and updating fixtures, flooring and décor over time will add to your enjoyment and help you keep your investment at its highest value.
